REGISTRATION

Online Registration

- 1. Go to the <u>State Convention website</u> and click on Congress of Christian Education/Registration.
- 2. Registration for the Congress and Youth and Young Adult Convention is separate. Therefore, you will need to complete two different registrations. You may also register as an individual or group.
- 3. Whether you register as an individual or group, complete the required information for the individual and/or organization, and the system will automatically calculate your registration fees.
- 4. Begin your registration by entering all required information, selecting group or individual registration and be prepared to provide a username and password. (This should also include a properly formatted email address, i.e. johndoe@yahoo.com.)
- 5. Proceed to the class registration by entering the name of each person and class selection. Repeat the registration for all individuals who will be attending.
- 6. After all class selections have been made, proceed to the final checkout by carefully reading and following the instructions to complete the online registration process.
- 7. You have the opportunity to choose to pay online with PayPal (Note: A PayPal Account is not needed to complete the online payment.) Other payment choices are:

On-Site Registration for Mail-In Registrants

- 3. Confirm that all badges and the correct number of packages are in your packet.
- 4. Registration complete!

On-Site Registration for Online Registrants

- 1. At the area designated "Pre-Registration," present your registration confirmation.
- 2. You should receive the name badges and packages for your group based on the number of persons who were pre-registered.
- 3. Confirm that you have all badges and a package for each registrant.
- 4. Registration complete!

On-Site Registration

Note: The registration and classification processes have been combined into a single step process. All persons who register must also select a class.

- 1. Proceed to the station titled "Registration." Only one person per group, church, or district will be allowed in the registration area.
- 2. One person representing your church or organization should obtain a registration packet that will include the registration form and class selection guide.
- 3. Make sure all persons in your delegation have selected a class from the class list.
- 4. Complete all Church/District/Local Congress/BTU-Sunday School information for your organization or church before entering the registration area.
- 5. Please observe all registration fees that are to be presented with your registration. See page 9 for registration fees.
- 6. Once the payment process has been completed, place the delegates' class selections and your organization's information together to be presented to the registration officials.
- 7. Your registration information and amount will be confirmed.
- 8. You will be given your packages containing all Congress information for each delegate along with the respective badges.
- 9. Go to each department that you have paid to participate with, show your receipt and Registration/Classification Form. You will be signed in and given needed information. **Please check all items before leaving the registration area.**
- 10. Registration complete!

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What if . . .

☐ I need to add to the number of persons registered?

If there are persons who you need to add to your registration, please make every effort to do so prior to the beginning of Congress by emailing the Baptist Headquarters at headquarters@gmbcofgeorgia.org with the name of the person and the class he/she will take. Do this for every person who needs to be added, and submit the additional registration fee.



☐ I need to remove persons from my registration?

In this case, let the person handling your registration know which names need to be removed. If you are requesting reimbursement, it will be mailed from the Baptist Headquarters within five working days after July 23.

■ What if a delegate wants to change a class?

The person who registered your church will have to complete a class registration form. Church registration verification must be provided. Submit the completed form to the registrar for same-day service. To get in the required number of hours (8), a delegate must change after the morning session on the first day. No changes after that. *Do not ask the teacher/instructor to change a class*. It is not permitted per the President and Dean of the Congress.

■ I need to add persons in place of someone who did not make the trip to the Youth and Young Adult Convention?

Return the badge of the person who is not attending. That badge will be replaced with one for the person attending in his/her place. The person at the check-in who is handling your registration will take care of this matter



GENERAL INFORMATION

The Oratorical Competition is designed to provide a public platform for youth to exhibit speaking, organizational and elocutionary skills. GMBC Congress Competition is divided into two categories. **Category I Competition** is designed for children and youth grades 1 through 9 and will follow local guidelines and rules. Category I topics will be a designated Article of Faith. **Category II Competition** is designed for young people grades 10 through 12. The Category II Competition will follow the guidelines and rules of the National Baptist Congress Oratorical Contest, and participants will speak on the official National Contest themes.

The Oratorical Contest will be held the week of the GMBC Congress of Christian Education.

Category I Guidelines and Rules

- 1. Each participant will recite the designated Article of Faith.
- 2. The specific Article of Faith will serve as the introduction to the speech.
- 3. The oration will be written by the speaker, with assistance from a speech coach.
- 4. Only one contestant per church/association per division will be accepted. All ties must be decided at the church/association level.
- 5. Preliminary competitions will be Monday and Tuesday, July 10 and 11.
- 6. Speech format:
 - a. The speech must be typewritten with one-inch margins, double-spaced, 12 point, Times-Roman (or equivalent) font.
 - b. The contestant's name should be typed as a header, flush right. The contestant's name, church, city and speech word count should be typed at the end of the speech, bottom left. If the contestant is representing an association, then the contestant's name and the association should be typed at the end of the speech.

Category II Guidelines and Rules

- 1. The speech topic will be the official themes of the National Baptist Congress Oratorical Contest.
- 2. Sophomores and Juniors will use the current theme while Seniors will use the theme for next year's national contest.
- 3. The speech must be original and prepared by the contestant.
- 4. Only one contestant per church/association per division will be accepted. All ties must be decided at the church/association level.
- 5. Preliminary competitions will be held Monday and Tuesday, July 10 and 11.
- 6. Speech format:
 - a. The speech must be typewritten with one-inch margins, double-spaced, 12 point, Times-Roman (or equivalent) font.
 - b. The contestant's name should be typed as a header, flush right. The contestant's name, church, city and speech word count should be typed at the end of the speech, bottom left. If the contestant is representing an association, then the contestant's name and the association should be typed at the end of the speech.

SPEECH PRESENTATION/ORATION

The contestant's presentation attire is

- Males: slacks, suit coats and shirts with ties
- Females: business dresses or suits (preferably white).

Please note the contestants may be on an elevated platform facing the audience.

The contestants are to stand, approach the lectern or designated space, state the theme, their contestant number, their first and last name and begin their memorized rendition of the written oration, within the frame of the lectern/podium or designated space (without moving across the stage).

The contestant's oratorical presentation must avoid speaking in sermonic tones, using testimonials and excessive gesturing. Contestants are not allowed to use props, costumes, clothing or prompts.

While contestants are not required to recite their speech verbatim, the style, theme, structure and organization of the presentation should closely adhere to the written documentation presented.

Judges

The judges are selected prior to the Congress of Christian Education. Each judge receives the guidelines and the judges score sheet during the judges training sessions. Each judge is scheduled to attend a training teleconference prior to the Congress session and will attend a final onsite review for participation and protocol. Each judge has attested to providing a fair and impartial scoring of each contestant.

The judges will use the following criteria for each oration: composition, subject matter, content originality, delivery, memorization, vocal control, enunciation, pronunciation, presentation and mastery of material. The oration must be memorized.

The judges will give each contestant an intangible score (is most commonly used to describe things that are recognized but not easily quantified) and in the event of a tie the contestant that has the highest intangible score will be the winning contestant.

The judges' overall decision is final.

Topics and Themes

Grades 1- 3: Article 1: The Scriptures, 150 words, 3 minutes
Grades 4 -6: Article 2: The True God, 250 words, 4 minutes
Grades 7-9: Article 3: The Fall of Man, 350 words, 5 minutes

Sophomores and Juniors: "What Should the Church Do to Help Individuals in My

Generation Understand Societal Issues (Social Justice, the

Pandemic, Racism)?" 500 words

Seniors: "Making the World a Better Place: GenZers Engaging in the

Work of Evangelism and Social Justice at Church and in the

Community" 500 words

Grade levels are based on the 2023-2024 academic year.

DEFINITIONS AND EXPLANATIONS

Excessive gesturing is determined at the judges' discretion. Contestant beware. Limit all movement, including your hands, as excessive gesturing or movement may result in disqualification.

SERMONIC TONES refers to "whooping" or "singing" at the conclusion or during any part of the oration.

TESTIMONIALS refers to framing the body or content of the speech around a personal testimony/story. This decision is made at the judges' discretion.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

I. The Scriptures

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us, and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions shall be tried.

II. The True God

We believe the Scriptures teach that there is one, and only one, living and true God, an infinite, intelligent Spirit, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of heaven and earth; inexpressibly glorious in holiness, and worthy of all possible honor confidence and love; that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every divine perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious offices in the great work of redemption.

III. The Fall of Man

We believe the Scriptures teach that Man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker; but by voluntary transgressions fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God, positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

CATEGORIES Mime – Praise Dance – Sign Language – Step Team – Spoken Word

- 1. Only one team/group/individual per category from a Church or District. Registration forms must be submitted to the coordinator of the Talent/Children and Youth Rally either electronically or by 10:00 a.m. Monday.
- 2. Each routine must be 2 to 4 minutes in length. Teams will not be permitted to continue if their performance is over the time limit.
- 3. Each group must supply their own music with a copy in hand to Bro. Terrell Dassau or his designee by 10:00 a.m. Monday. This must be in the form of a CD labeled with the name of the song and group.
- 4. Attire should reflect an atmosphere of worship and modesty. Low cut tops, midriffs, shorts, tank tops, etc. will not be permitted. All participants are expected to be properly attired for their performance. (The Talent/Children and Youth Rally coordinators will serve as the authority on the dress code.)
- 5. Music for all categories must be of the Christian/Inspirational nature.
- 6. Participants will need to be present at 1:00 p.m. Thursday for practice. A representative from each individual/group/team will be expected to be present to help with music.

DELEGATE GUIDELINES

Revised May 19, 2021

The following are guidelines that should assist the delegates who will attend the Children, Youth and Young Adult Convention of the GMBC Congress of Christian Education.

Delegates: Your cooperation and obedience in following these guidelines will enhance the fellowship of the session and will be appreciated by the Chaperone Committee.

Badges will identify chaperones and staff, and they must be respected at all times.

I. Home

These guidelines shall be placed in the hands of Pastors, Churches, Chaperones, Parents, and Attendees in order that everyone involved with the children and youth may be informed on what is expected of the children, youth, chaperones and young adults as they attend the Convention sessions. The Congress office will mail a copy of these guidelines to all churches registered with the Convention.

- A. The guidelines will be printed on a different color sheet and mailed to all churches on the same roster.
- B. Parents should get as much information as possible about the location of the Children, Youth and Young Adult Convention, including the street address and telephone number.

II. Church

Only youth who are members of and attend their local church should be selected as delegates. The conduct of such youth should be exemplary of their home church. Prior to departure for the Congress, the Youth Director or Lead Chaperone of each church should conduct a brief seminar or counseling period with the parents and youth to remind them of why and where they are going, the purpose of these guidelines and that **they will be representing their HOME and their CHURCH.**

III. Pastor

The Pastor should have a record of those attending the Children, Youth and Young Adult Convention. The Pastor should remind the youth of how they should conduct themselves and stress to the chaperones the importance of being at the Convention and their obligations.

- A. Each Pastor is encouraged to hold prayer for the Convention and the delegates who will be attending. This should remind them of the religious nature of the Convention and the need for God to be with the members while they are away.
- B. Make sure your delegates are properly chaperoned.
- C. Delegates should be informed to wait at designated areas where classes are held. If necessary, the chaperone will attend classes with the delegates.
- D. The primary duty of the chaperones will be to provide supervision of the delegates AT ALL TIMES. The age of each chaperone must be 21 years and older.
- E. Chaperones may register and attend at no cost.
- F. Chaperones must be available to receive assignments from the Director of Chaperones each day.

IV. Traveling

Youth traveling to the Convention should be under the guidance of the Pastor and/or Chaperone(s) at all times. Stay together as a group. Youth should also be reminded of their conduct in and around fast-food restaurants as they stop to dine or refresh. Bus/Van Drivers should be informed of the number of children onboard and of the chaperone in charge. Please remember to wear your seatbelts.

V. Delegate to Chaperone Ratio

The number of youths in attendance at the Convention has increased each year; therefore, in order to provide adequate and proper supervision of the youth, churches are to send a minimum of one (1) chaperone for every five (5) delegates of the same gender. In the event a delegate becomes sick, a second chaperone needs to be available without jeopardizing the proper supervision for the remaining delegates. Please try to provide at least one chaperone per 1-5 girls and one chaperone per 1-5 boys. Age ranges for the delegates are as follows: Children 5-12, Youth 13-18 and Young Adults 19-25.

- A. COVID Protocols. Face masks are to be worn during the entire Convention. Delegates should have a supply to accommodate their needs. Chaperones should have extra face masks and sanitizer for their delegates.
- B. Medication/Medical Emergencies. If any youth is on medication, the parent or guardian should send the medication to the Convention with the chaperones with directions for dosage. The church should also have a release form authorizing the chaperone to take the child to an Emergency Room and the ER preference information in the event any child becomes ill. The church should have reliable emergency contact(s) for each child attending the Convention.
- C. Curfew. Youth delegates should be in their rooms by 10:00 p.m.
 - 1. A Lead Chaperone and Assistant Chaperones will be selected at the chaperone meeting for each motel/hotel.
 - 2. Other Chaperones will be assigned for each motel/hotel (to report to Lead Chaperone).
 - 3. The Lead Chaperone reports any concerns or questions to either Co-Chair, and/or Secretary of Chaperones.
- D. Contents in Room. Chaperones need to check and verify the condition of rooms upon check-in. Please do not misplace, break or misuse items in any room. Notify motel/hotel office if a bar is in the room and have it removed. Chaperones will be responsible for monitoring phone calls made on the motel/hotel phones.
- E. Chaperones. Make sure room doors are locked at all times, when in or out of the room. Keep your key with you at all times. Verify that all delegates are securely in their rooms before retiring to yours.
- F. Electronic Devices. All device use is under the discretion, direction and supervision of the chaperones, worship leaders and instructors with adherence to the following guidelines:
 - 1. Talking on cell phones will not be tolerated for any reason during classes or during any worship or assembly.
 - 2. No texting during classes—unless instructed to do so by the instructor—or during any worship or assembly.
 - 3. No wearing headphones/earbuds or listening to iPods, iPads, cell phones, computers, MP3's or other devices during classes or during service. Be aware of your surroundings and keep volume low while in common areas.
- G. Cards. Playing cards is not allowed at the Convention. UNO cards are acceptable.
- H. Personal Vehicles. Anyone driving a personal vehicle should not park in any restricted or undesignated area. Violations of this rule will result in the vehicle being towed at the owner's expense. Vehicles should be registered with your room if staying in a motel or hotel.

VI. Elevators

When using elevators at various places, be careful at all times. An elevator can transport only a designated number of people. Due to COVID restrictions, the elevator capacity might be reduced. Check the weight capacity and other signs posted near and inside the elevator. Do not play on the elevators.

VII. Recreation

The individual Churches, Pastors, Youth Directors and Chaperones should provide planned, properly supervised, recreational activities outside of the designated class periods, worship services and scheduled convention activities.

Swimming is prohibited during the week of the Convention. *Delegates, including chaperones, are not to be in the pool area at any time.*

VIII. Shopping

While shopping, remember shoplifters will be **PROSECUTED!** Know the people with whom you plan to shop. Each group must be accompanied by a chaperone at all times.

IX. Classes

Delegates who do not attend class will be reported to Convention/Congress officials. Delegates who are seen in the hallways during class/assembly time will be asked their destination and if necessary, reported to the Convention/Congress officials.

All Delegates—Children, Youth and Young Adults—should remain in Worship/General Assembly until the Benediction. No hanging out in bathrooms, hallways or outside.

X. Dress Code for All Delegates

Casual dress will be observed by all Youth and Young Adults attending the Convention.

Girls

Dress Days: Church Attire – Appropriate shirts, blouses, knee length or longer skirts/dresses, appropriate shoes.

Talent/Children and Youth Rally Day: White tops or dress, loose fitting T-shirts with no logos, writings or art. Light colored long khaki pants or skirts with appropriate shoes.

Acceptable Casual attire

- Knee length or longer skirts/dresses/jumpers; pants, jeans or khakis
- Hosiery or socks (optional), appropriate shoes
- T-shirts with church name and/or religious messages

Unacceptable Dress for Casual Days

- Spaghetti straps, tube tops, midriffs, halter tops (Cleavage must be covered.)
- T-shirts with commercial ads (Name of church and religious messages are permitted.)
- Shorts, jeggings, jeans with holes, sagging pants or jeans and leggings without tops that extend to the knee
- Sleepwear
- Flip-flops, house shoes or slides
- Bikinis or almost bikinis (swim wear), visible underwear
- · Hair should be groomed, no sleep bonnets



Boys

Dress Days: Church Attire – Appropriate dress shirts, polo shirts, slacks and pants (no shorts)

Youth Rally Day: White shirts, white loose-fitting T-shirts with no logos, writings or art. Shirts should be tucked in. Light colored long khaki pants with appropriate shoes, pants with belts worn on the waist, appropriate shoes

Acceptable Dress for Casual Days

- Well-fitting pants, jeans or khakis with belts worn on waist at all times
- Dress, polo and banded neck shirts
- Shirts must be tucked inside of pants
- Appropriate shoes

Unacceptable Dress for Casual Days

- T-shirts with commercial ads (Name of church and religious messages are permitted.)
- Undershirts as outerwear and tank tops
- Shorts, jeans with holes, sagging pants or jeans
- Sleepwear
- Doo-rags, stocking caps, hats backward (no hats worn in buildings)
- Flip-flops, house shoes or slides
- Earrings
- Visible underwear or undershorts

Proper dress during classes and worship service is a must. This particular guideline is **very important** for many reasons; therefore, Pastors, Youth Directors and Chaperones must encourage delegates to be obedient. Be sure delegates are properly dressed and ready to attend sessions *before* leaving the hotel. This includes **BADGES AND MASKS (OPTIONAL)**. All delegates are to wear badges at all times during the Convention. If delegates do not have badges, please submit name(s) to Chaperone leadership upon arrival to the site each morning.

XI. Prohibited Substances or Criminal Activity

Illegal drugs, smoking, vaping and alcoholic beverages are not allowed at the Convention site or in the motel/hotel rooms by anyone at any time.

Absolutely no criminal activity – vandalism, theft of any kind, underage drinking – will not be tolerated in any area of the Convention. Violators will be prosecuted.
